Democratic Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi is the first woman in American history to lead a major party in the U.S. Congress. What other women now hold positions of power in U.S. government. Can you name women leaders in other countries?
- 2. Few outside of Alaska had heard of Sarah Palin until she was named John McCain's running mate. Are woman politicians held to a different standard? Which recent Presidents have been state governors before running for the presidency?
- 3. Do some research to explain what the arguments were against women's suffrage. Some U.S. citizens are still not allowed to vote in certain states. Who are they?
