

Talking points

- 1. Nick Anderson's cartoon about the devastating earthquake in Port-au-Prince, points out an ongoing tragedy that underscores the recent catastrophe in Haiti. Haiti is listed as the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere, but it took a deadly earthquake to mobilize the world to help. Was the hand sticking out of the rubble the first thing you noticed in the cartoon? Probably not. Is that a subtle part of the cartoonist's message?
- 2. What does the expression on Uncle Sam's face say to you?
- 3. Has the world ignored Haiti before the earthquake? When was the last time you noticed a news story about the country? How long do you think the attention will be focused on the Caribbean nation?
