Talking points

- 1. Jake Fuller's cartoon draws a simple, straight-forward analogy between motorcycle riders who don't wear helmets and the Mother Goose rhyme, Humpty Dumpty. Restate the point of this cartoon in one sentence as a simile.
- 2. Can you make a counter-argument to the cartoon's point?
- 3. What if the motorcycle rider was a bicycle rider instead. Would you still agree with the analogy? Should all bicycle riders be required to wear helmets if they risk splattering their brains out? Why or why not? What's the difference?

Gather a collection of political cartoons from your newspaper. Using the Cartoon Evaluation Worksheet (available online at the NIE Website) analyze each cartoon and define which ones use an analogy to make a point.
