Between the lines

Studying political cartoons helps provide context to some basic literary concepts:

Satire: A literary work in which human vice or folly is attacked through irony, derision, or wit.

Irony: Something humorous based on contradiction: Words or situations suggesting the opposite of their literal meaning.

Sarcasm: Remarks that mean the opposite of what they seem to say and are intended to mock or deride
