



Tampa Bay Times Newspaper in Education program wins awards

Three educational publications produced by the <u>Tampa Bay Times Newspaper in Education</u> program have received awards in the 2021 <u>National Newspaper Association Better Newspaper Editorial Contest</u> in the NIE - Partnerships category.

Pathways to Understanding: Creating Community through Allyship was awarded First Place. This publication was produced in partnership with Community Tampa Bay, the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation and the Doris Duke Foundation for Islamic Art's Building Bridges Program. It presents an overview of Muslim culture, busts some myths about Islam and Muslims, and explores the causes and consequences of Islamophobia, prejudice and discrimination. Reduce Your Use: The Dos and Don'ts of Recycling in Hillsborough County 2019 was awarded Second Place. This bilingual publication, produced in partnership with Hillsborough County Recycling, focused on helping students and community members understand the environmental impact of single-use plastics, waste reduction and reducing, reusing and recycling. NEA Big Read: The Things They Carried was awarded Third Place. This publication was produced in partnership with the Hillsborough County Public Library Cooperative as part of the National Endowment for the Arts' Big Read program. It focused on Tim O'Brien's 1990 novel *The Things They Carried*, considered one of the most important books about the experience of war. It was written by Jodi Pushkin, *Times* staff, and designed by Lisa Schillinger, *Times* staff.
